This is helping me practise my professional interpreting skills whilst making a positive change in my community.

In the future I would like to become a freelance translator and interpreter as I have always wanted to work in the United Nations. I am very interested in current affairs and consider myself aware of the social, environmental, economic, and political issues our society is facing. I especially want to enact change to make sure that future generations of immigrants in the UK have an equal chance in life.

Ultimately, I want to run a humanitarian translation service for those who are lacking the language skills needed when first moving to the country and are potentially at disadvantage which reflects my personal qualities of compassion, hard work and empathy.

20. Is there any other information that you would like the selection panel to take in to account when making their decisions on which applications to take through to the next stage of the process?

I feel I deserve a Next Steps Bursary because I am a resilient person and have always worked hard to achieve things.

Next year I would like to undertake a course in translation and interpretation, and as I come from a low-income household, my parents are unable to support me financially to achieve this.

I have thoroughly researched a number of grants and unfortunately for various reasons, I do not qualify under their narrow eligibility criteria. Therefore, I am disadvantaged by the criteria which would imply I am in a fortunate position; however this couldn't be further from the truth.

Having migrated twice with my family from Spain to France and then later to the UK, I have faced and overcome several challenges. Initially, after the 2008 financial crash my family had no access to a living and needed to move to where the jobs were. The financial hardship left my family making tough decisions about spending and saving money; something which I have learnt dearly about. I have always felt that I haven't had the same upbringing as the rest of my peers as my education has been disrupted several times and I have had to learn two different languages at the same time as completing my schooling in both France and the UK.

Learning a new language whilst trying to integrate into a new school was tough and although I still sometimes struggle with some of the English grammar, I have come a long way, achieving good grades at GCSE and am now working towards my A-levels.

These experiences have led to my resilient attitude and proactive approach to my education and future.

Having access to financial support would help me to overcome further difficulties and challenges and allow me to reach my true potential but I am also keen to apply for the additional input of a mentor to help me set up my own business and fulfil my dream of becoming a freelance translator. With the support of a mentor I hope to grow my confidence within the academic and social sphere and benefit from the sounding board and insight of someone who has experience.

Section 5 - How do you intend to use the funds if you are successful?

I am applying for a multi-year bursary as I would like extra support with my course fees, as they aren't covered by Student Finance England. The fees for the two-year course I'll be taking: *Certificate of Translation and Interpreting in German* by the *Chartered Institute of Linguists*, are £3,500 per academic year (£7,000 in in total).

I am currently working part-time in Tesco as a customer service assistant, and I am also doing the odd paid tutoring sessions. I earn £120 per month from Tesco and approx. £20 a month for tutoring (one session per week at £5). However, my current income is spent on train tickets to get me to and from school, so I'm unable to save money towards my course fees.

If I am awarded the Next Steps Bursary, in addition to financial support, I would also welcome advice on how to set up my own business. I would like to learn from a mentor who has entrepreneurial experience who can coach me and help me develop my skills so that I can fulfil my dream of becoming a freelance translator.
